## Interfaith Keeping Families and the Elderly in Their Warm Homes This Winter

Lynchburg area residents have experienced one of the most diverse winters we have seen in years. From 80 degree weather in December to 10+ inches of snow in January, their heating and cooling needs have changed drastically and so have their thermostats. While those warm temperatures enabled people to postpone the need to turn on their heat, they also required people to run their AC longer than usual. We expect that in the next few weeks we will see a large increase in need for assistance with electric and gas bills after the havoc of winter storm Jonas.

At Interfaith Outreach Association, we take a more holistic approach to assisting those who come in our doors in need of assistance with a bill. We talk with each one of them about the circumstances that led to them being unable to

pay their bill and make recommendations for other agencies that they may be able to work with to help them improve their current situation. We pay close attention to the other bills that they are responsible for paying to help them prioritize their expenses and to help them identify places where they may be overpaying to eliminate some expenses. In looking at those bills and receipts, we are able to confirm that each person who receives services from Interfaith is truly in financial need. We appreciate your continued support as we work with our neighbors in need to help them find comfort at home.

### 2015 Statistics

- 2,764 people, including 1,228 children, received emergency assistance with eviction notices, utility cutoffs, and fuel tank fill ups allowing families to stay together in their own home
- 4,619 letters of encouragement were sent to inmates
- 8,573 people learned more about IOA through outreach
- 249 individuals received free furniture
- 418 people benefited from our Vision Information Program Support Groups
- 54 houses were repaired to allow needy people to stay in their homes
- 218 inmates participated in the Life Skills Classes in the Blue Ridge Jail system
- 4,199 referrals were made to other agencies that can offer further assistance
- 219 needy individuals received necessities such as groceries and toiletries
- 7,196 hours of time were donated to IOA's programs by our dedicated volunteers
- . 852 furniture items were given to clients in need which included beds, dressers, kitchen tables, and sofas
- 105 individuals participated in our Return, Learn, and Earn Class and another 147 received aftercare counseling

## **Assisting the Elderly**

At the core of what we do, Interfaith Outreach strives to help keep those who come to us in need in their homes. For the elderly, helpin them to retain their independence does exactly that.

Through the Interfaith Rebuilds program, we are able to perform small home repairs that make a big difference. Whether we are building a ramp, putting in an accessible toilet, repairing broken floor boards, or patching a hole in the roof, these repairs mean the difference in someone being able to stay in the home they worked hard to purchase and being forced to move to an assisted living facility or nursing home. In 2015, we were able to work on 54 homes in the Central Virginia area, helping all of those residents to remain in their homes.

Participants in our Vision Transportation Program, many who are elderly, are able to receive much needed rides to their medical appointments. Whether they are in need of a weekly ride to physical therapy or chemo treatments or an occasional ride to another medical appointment, being able to get to their appointments allows them to stay in their homes and maintain their independence without having to pay for transportation.

# Return, Learn, and Earn Job Skills Class Sees Increase in Employment Success for Participants

Interfaith Outreach Association's *Return, Learn, and Earn* class has moved to a new day. The class now meets every Monday at noon at the IOA office located at 701 Clay Street. This one hour class consists of a rotating five week schedule which can be started and finished at any time. Participants learn about conducting a proactive job search, interview skills, job retention, soft skills, and the "nitty gritty" of resumes and cover letters. Participants are also able to schedule appointments for additional resume assistance.

In 2015, Return, Learn, and Earn saw 105 participants come through the program. Using the skills that they learned during the class, most of these participants have been able to find and keep a job as a result of their participation in the Return, Learn, and Earn class.

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported that the City of Lynchburg's unemployment rate came in at 4.9% in 2015, just above the national average. Following the U.S. Census, Lynchburg was reported to have roughly 37% of its employed citizens living below poverty level and the total poverty level was at 24%.

Through cooperation with many agencies in the Lynchburg area including Roads to Recovery and VADOC's Probation and Parole, Interfaith Outreach Association is actively working to combat the unemployment and poverty rates in the area. The Blue Ridge ReEntry Council, chaired by Progressive Release Director Steve Monetti, meets monthly to discuss barriers to employment, housing, and other factors affecting people reentering society to help bridge the gap between incarceration and successful reintegration.

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
